## **PASTOR'S PAGE**

#### **COVID**

On May 1st, 2022, at the end of our church service, I addressed the concern members had about me being sick on Easter Sunday. Many were upset that I did not wear a mask while preaching. Others felt I should not have been there at all.

I opened the meeting with Hymn 760 "What God Ordains Is Always Good" verses 1, 3, 5, and 6. The hymn was composed for a man who had a serious illness. After the hymn was composed, he miraculously recovered. Let's focus on verse 3.

What God ordains is always good: His loving thought attends me.

No poison can be in the cup that my physician sends me.

My God is true, each morning new

I trust His grace unending, my life to Him commending.

"No poison can be in the cup that my physician sends me". The hymnist is writing about the cup of blessing—The Lord's Supper. I can remember discussing the reception of the Lord's Supper with Pastor Jagow, my Confirmation pastor who had a heart condition. He died while distributing the Lord's Supper! In our Confirmation instruction, he stated that when we receive the wine (Christ's blood) with a common cup, we receive it the way Jesus instituted it.

During the AIDS scare of the 80's, there was a push for individual cups. Many pastors reluctantly capitulated. Many churches used little glass cups. Some churches bought individual sterling silver chalices. Now, to avoid having to do all of the washing, we use plastic cups. Later it was discovered that AIDS could not be transmitted via common cup. Many congregations returned to distributing Christ's blood with the chalice and kept the individual cup as well. Still other churches, like Bethany, did not compromise and stayed with the plastic individual cups.

I had a very wise Christian say to me, "If Christ is all knowing, would he not have known of all the communicable diseases before instituting the common cup?" Would the "cup of blessing" be poison to us modern Christians? Pastor Jagow pointed our Confirmation class back to the 1st Commandment. "You shall have no other gods before me." Luther, who lived during the worst of human plagues, defines the commandment, "We should fear, love and **TRUST** in God above all things!"

We are to **TRUST** God above all things! Above the Fauci's of the world. They can give us guidance...6 feet apart...wearing a mask...but when it comes to Christians gathering...hearing God's Word...pouring water and speaking over a baby...and receiving the body and blood of Christ from the hand of God's called servant—I'll obey God over men (Act 5:29). Again, would God really harm you by receiving the sacrament? I believe He would not! Trust God above all things!

Yes, Easter I was sick with COVID. I did not know I had it. It was not until Julie tested positive on account of an upcoming minor surgery. She found out the Monday evening after Easter... I found out the Tuesday evening after Easter. I tested positive. I did not have a fever...I had cold symptoms and laryngitis— a pastor's curse. On Easter Sunday, before the service, I met with my elders and asked them to distribute the sacrament, as I was not feeling well. At the time of the Lord's Supper, I consecrated the elements with the lids on... I sat down and did not come close to the elements. After the distribution, I served myself. I did not greet parishioners before or after the service. I disrobed and went home.

Some were irritated that I preached maskless...I followed the current CDC guidelines that allows pastors to do a service unmasked. However, when it comes to distribution they should refrain and that's exactly what I did. Many who attended and viewed the service on Good Friday knew I had no voice. Ironically, Saturday to Sunday I was feeling better. Even if I tested positive on Good Friday...I still would have done what I did... I'm called to be your Pastor in or out of a pandemic.

Before entering the ministry, we were at a congregation in White Hall, Michigan where Pastor Dorrow served. He had a condition he knew that he couldn't spread to others, but he could be infected by others (And could potentially be infected with something that could eventually incapacitate him). He went to work every week. He shook everyone's hands after every service despite his condition. The day of his retirement came, and everyone celebrated. He spent the first week of retirement with his 3 granddaughters. They were very precious to him. At the end of that week his granddaughters were diagnosed with chicken pox. A few days later he came down with shingles and by the next week he had died from complications. His daughter became distraught, fearing his grandchildren gave him the disease that killed him. In her distress, her father's doctor gave her these words of comfort, "A child having chicken pox cannot give an elderly person shingles." It was that his immunity was so weakened, that the shingles manifest itself. The following Monday, just two weeks after his retirement, I sang for his funeral. He was the pastor that prepared, encouraged, and strengthened me for the ministry.

I'll conclude with the hymnodist's final verse:

What God ordains is always good: This truth remains unshaken. Though sorrow, need, or death be mine, I shall not be forsaken. I fear no harm, for with His arm He shall embrace and shield me; SO TO MY GOD I YIELD ME.
